The Department's sub-consultant, Brockington and Associates, Inc., has completed three volumes of cultural resources reports of the selected alternate corridor for the above referenced project. Three copies of Volume III are included for your review and comment.

Volume III is the Archaeological Survey draft report. This report provides a project summary, describes the methods of cultural resources investigations, and provides an archaeological predictive model. Three previously identified archaeological sites (38HR289, 38HR305, and 38MA175) were located within the Archaeological Survey Universe. Sites 38HR289 and 38HR305 were identified prior to the construction of S. C. Route 22 and were not revisited. Site 38MA175 was previously recommended potentially eligible for the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP). Investigations for the present project resulted in a recommendation of not eligible for the NRHP for site 38MA175.

This report provides the results of the intensive archaeological survey. The survey resulted in the identification of 53 new archaeological sites within the Archeological Survey Universe. Of these sites, 52 were recommended not eligible for the NRHP and no additional investigations are recommended. Site 38HR560 is recommended potentially eligible for the NRHP. Evaluative testing of this site is recommended. If test excavations recommend the site is not eligible for the NRHP, no additional investigations or actions will be needed. If site 38HR560 is determined eligible for the NRHP and it cannot be avoided, a data recovery plan will be developed and implemented prior to construction and in consultation with your office.

There are 26 historic cemeteries within the preferred alternate corridor. Two historic cemeteries (Lane-0219 and Sardis-0112) are located within the survey universe and should be avoided. The remaining 24 cemeteries are outside the preferred alternate and will not be affected.

The review of these recent cultural resources reports with a large number of significant and potentially eligible architectural and archaeological sites on this large and complex project could be a daunting task. We would like to offer you an opportunity to view additional maps and figures if you desire. The LPA Group will provide the Department and your office with a presentation of the proposed alignment for the Southern Corridor shown on high-resolution aerial photographs in the vicinity of any and all sites necessary. This should make the determinations of effects much easier to visualize. This presentation would probably take place at the offices of the LPA Group where numerous large-scale maps are available that are not easily transportable. Researchers from Brockington and Associates would also be present to provide assistance.

In accordance with the memorandum of agreement approved by the Federal Highway Administration, March 16, 1993, the Department is providing this information as agency official designee, as defined under 36 CFR 800.2, to ensure compliance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act.

It is requested that you review the enclosed material and, if appropriate, indicate your concurrence in the Department's findings, thus initiating the formal Section 106 consultation process. Please respond within 30 days if you have any objections or if you have need of additional information.





While EPA realizes that one of the primary purposes of the project is to promote economic development, it is still crucial to consider a broad range of alternatives during the early scoping process. We expect that when further detailed data is evaluated, some preliminary alternatives may be eliminated from consideration due to data refinements and potential impacts. Current, accurate data should be used to ensure that a reasonable range of preliminary alternatives for a project of this magnitude and importance be considered, so that after refinements take place a range of viable alternatives will be left to be considered.

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) requested the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Charleston District, participate as a cooperating agency in the preparation of an Environmental Impact Statement for the I-73 project. As stated in 40 CFR 1501.6, the FHWA, as the lead Federal action agency, may request any other agency that has jurisdiction by law or special expertise with respect to an environmental issue to be a cooperating agency. In accordance with the above stated regulations, the Corps formally accepts your invitation to become a cooperating agency.

In addition, FHWA and the South Carolina Department of Transportation requested concurrence regarding the Interagency Coordination Process for the I-73 project. The Interagency Coordination Process has outlined the level of agency involvement, key decision points in the NEPA/permitting process, as well as a dispute resolution process. We accept this approach and in turn provide our concurrence on the Interagency Coordination Process. We are committed to integrating and streamlining our permit review process with your planning and environmental review processes.

Lastly, the FHWA and the SCDOT requested concurrence regarding the purpose and need for this project. We accept the stated purpose and need and provide concurrence in that regard. Please be advised that upon receipt of a permit application for the proposed project, the Corps will make a separate determination of project purpose for its evaluation under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act. The Corps determination of project purpose may differ from the applicant's when making the distinction between basic and overall project purpose.

This being the first attempt to merge the NEPA/404 processes between FHWA, SCDOT, and the Corps, Charleston District, we have recognized some fundamental differences in the way our agencies conduct an environmental review of the projects which we are involved. This is primarily due to the Corps authority under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act. The Section 404(b)(1) Guidelines require that the Corps define the project's basic and overall project purpose, determine if the project is water dependent, and conduct an analysis of practicable alternatives.

The Corps is concerned regarding critical decisions made on the EIS as a "consensus vote" when we are either unable to take a position or our position is contrary to the consensus of the interagency team. These decisions may jeopardize our ability to utilize documentation from

the EIS and require subsequent analysis, specifically, our utilization of the alternatives analysis in the EIS to determine the project's compliance with the Section 404(b)(1) Guidelines. Therefore, we feel it is paramount that FHWA, SCDOT, and the Corps meet to understand each others missions and statutory requirements, define the merged process, and resolve outstanding issues.

We appreciate your invitation and look forward to our continued collaboration with you on this project. Please be advised that our concurrences are based upon the most current information available. If new information becomes available that requires further consideration, the concurrence may in turn be affected. Although we anticipate our participation as cooperating agency will help facilitate the permit process, it can in no way guarantee permit issuance.





It is important to note that ACT members should be empowered to attend ACT team meetings and make important project decisions. The intent is for each agency's ACT team member to stick with the I-73 project for the duration of the EIS and permitting, approximately 3 years.

Step 2 – Produce a Signed Process Agreement

The next step is to have all ACT members agree to an Interagency Coordination Process for the I-73 project. A professional facilitator will be employed to make sure that ACT members have input to shape the design of the process. Once ACT members have agreed to a process, a written agreement will be signed by all ACT members.

The process agreement will outline the level of involvement for each agency. The agreement will also spell out key decision points in the NEPA/ permitting process. Once the ACT members have made a decision on the project, that decision will not be revisited.

The process agreement will also include a detailed dispute resolution process. If, for some reason, a decision cannot be agreed upon by the ACT members, then the decision will be elevated according to the dispute resolution process.






